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

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The most frightening enemy of Humanity

At the end of twenty years of war, the United States has been defeated and humiliated this time by jihadist fighters in Afghanistan. Typical of a horror and suspense film, the last troops of the most powerful country on Earth crowded into the Kabul airport to return to their country after the military and political failure of its tens of thousands of soldiers and weapons of mass destruction with which they vainly tried to take over this Asian country, of its natural riches and destiny. More than 2,600 young soldiers lost their lives far from home, while another 2,740 returned physically and mentally unable to resume a normal life. Not to mention the million squandered on the battlefields when we think that in the United States there are also enormous shortages and so many poor and segregated.

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In general, the biased international information omits that, in addition to these victims, there are more than 100,000 Afghans who died in this same conflict; among them some 47,000 civilians including women and children. It will cost a lot to take full stock of the tragedy, with which the White House will be able to manufacture new war scenarios so that its multimillion-dollar war resources make some sense and provide new business in the activity that is known to be the most profitable on earth. However, it is difficult that, for now, its war machine and its military hosts will return to Asia or Africa after such resounding defeats. This forces us to be very cautious in Latin America, because, of what there is no doubt, is that imperialist voracity and its military budgets need to be constantly fed with the invasions consummated by the United States. It seems clear that being the ruler of this superpower is tantamount to becoming one of the most fearsome genocidal of the present as a terrifying danger to humanity.



Sixty or seventy years ago the destabilization of democracies in our continent was due to the role of Nixon, Kennedy and other presidents who in this matter did not differ from the Bushes, Obamas, Trumps and Bidens. Although we must recognize that the corrupt politicians of Brazil, Chile, Argentina and Uruguay paved the way for them, unlike the resistance put up against them by Fidel Castro and the Cuban Revolution, in whose territory (Bay of Pigs) the imperialist occupation forces were also conclusively defeated and forced to return to Miami.
