## Palestine and the Middle East

A report reveals that 3825 Yemeni children have been killed and 4157 injured since the start of the war launched by the so-called Riyadh-led coalition.

According to a report published Thursday by the Yemen-based Organization Entesaf for the Rights of Women and Children, since the beginning of the so-called Saudi-led coalition's invasion of Yemen on March 25, 2015, the number of children who have lost their lives rises to 3825 and to 4157 that of those injured.

The note also states that more than three million infants suffer from severe malnutrition, which triggers the death of about 300 children a day, due to the aggression of Saudi Arabia and its regional and Western allies against the poorest country in the Arab world.

The data announced by the report, which was cited by local broadcaster *Al-Masirah*, also revealed that more than 3,000 children suffer from congenital anomalies, 71,000 have tumors, while another 3,000 need open-heart surgery.

On the other hand, the closure of the Sana'a International Airport, located in the capital of Yemen, due to the siege of the Saudi coalition, has prevented more than 30,000 children with various chronic diseases from traveling abroad to receive necessary treatment.

In addition, the agency revealed that more than 559 children suffer from various disabilities caused by the violence of war.

The aim of the invasion was to return power to the fugitive Yemeni former president, Abd Rabu Mansur Hadi, an ally of Riyadh, and to weaken the popular Ansarolá movement.

Human rights organizations continue to warn of the catastrophic consequences of the conflict in Yemen; however, Riyadh has ignored voices demanding an end to the war and accountability for the crimes it has committed in Yemen.
