Koldo Sagaseta: Juan Carlos (Koldo) Campos Sagaseta de Ilúrdoz Born in Iruñea / Pamplona (Euskal Herria / Basque Country) on April 14, 1954, he is a poet and playwright who has published the poetry books Miermelada, The Chusma Herald and La Caja Negra, as well as the plays ¡Hágase la mujer!, La verdadera historia del descubrimiento de América, El rey Necio, The woman of applause and some pieces for coffee-theater, such as The Lady of the Camellias... back. He has also written some scripts for cinema, children's stories and short stories. He won the Gregorio Aguilar Barea poetry prize in Nicaragua (1984) and won the La tertulia del Patio poetry prize in 2001 in the Dominican Republic. He became a Dominican citizen in 1981, a country in which he lived for a long time, before returning to the Basque Country in 2005, he participated as a literacy brigade member and worked as a creative in the national Sandinista propaganda system in 1984 He worked as a proofreader and columnist in the Dominican newspaper El Nacional,

where he published the daily column Cronopiando. He currently publishes in Gara (www.gara.net) (Basque Country) and in the Brazilian newspaper www.desacato.info. Collaborator of La Pluma.
